On Sunday evening, September 6 at 5:30 p.m., hundreds of Waller County citizens gathered at the Waller County Courthouse to pray for our county, country, and for law enforcement. The event began with the crowd singing the "Star-Spangled Banner", followed by an invocation by Journey Church Pastor Jonie Scruggs.

After the invocation, the Waller County Chaplain initiated the march from the courthouse to the sheriff's office with the words, "Let's GoForth", using the name of the recently fallen Harris Countv Sheriff's Deputy, Darren Go-Forth. The crowd stretched along the entire block of 8th St. between the Waller County Courthouse and the Waller County Sheriff's Office.

Dozens of local law enforcement were also in attendance, including WCSO deputies, Waller County Constables, city police officers from Waller, Hempstead, and Prairie View as well as troopers from the Texas Department of Public Safety. In addition, several local fire departments as well as Waller County EMS were represented.

Upon arrival at the sheriff's office, the walkers joined in singing "I'll Fly Away", while waiting for the rest of the crowd to arrive. Then Richard Jennings, Pastor of River of Praise Church, led the first prayer, calling on the protection of God and asking His angels

On Wednesday, September 2, the Waller County Commissioners Court met in regular session at 9 a.m. in the Waller County Courthouse. Waller County Judge Trey Duhon led the meeting also attended by Commissioners Justin Beckendorff, Jeron Barnett, and John Amsler.



Waller City Council Proposes 2015-16 Budget, Tax Rate

On Monday, August 31, the Waller City Council met at 6 p.m. at the Waller Public Works Building, located at 1119 Saunders St. in Waller. Mayor Danny Marburger conducted the meeting, also attended by council members Nancy Arnold, Edna Eaton, Dwayne Hajek, Mike McCormick and Sidney Johnson.

Mayor Marburger has filed the proposed 2015-2016 Operating Budget with the City Secretary, Cynthia Ward. According to Ward, citizens are welcome to stop by the Office of the City Secretary to view the proposed budget. The city council will hold a public hearing on the proposed budget and its adoption on Monday, September 28, 2015 at 7 p.m. in the Waller ISD Boardroom.

The City Council has proposed a 2015-2016 tax rate at \$0.5211 per \$100 valuation. The preceding year's tax rate was \$0.53691. The slightly lower rate is due to an across-the-board hike in property valuations by the Waller County Appraisal District.

Also, council voted to move the September 21 meeting to Monday, September 28.

In addition, since the prior Finance Officer, Deborah LaDay, is no longer in the employ of the City of Waller, council voted to contact Texas First Group for an interim finance officer until a replacement can be hired.

Due to the City of Waller not having a police chief in place, council also voted to promote Sgt. Michael Williams to captain.

Local Police and Houston SWAT Ends Stand-off at 2920 Exxon

On Monday night, August 31, 2015, a male caller contacted his home dispatch in Gibson County, Indiana at 11 p.m. and stated he was in his truck in the parking lot of the Exxon gas station on FM 2920 in Waller. The caller proceeded to tell dispatch that he had watched a Waller County Deputy walk into a nearby Jack-in-the Box, and that he was waiting for the deputy to leave the store so he could shoot him.

Gibson County Central Dispatch kept talking to the suspect, trying to keep him

calm and immediately contacted Waller County to report the situation. Waller County Dispatch then called the deputy who had been threatened, asking him not to exit the store. Then local law enforcement was alerted and Waller Police Sgt. M. Lopez and Officer L. Predente were dispatched to the scene along with other area officers.

Lopez contacted Captain Michael Williams and advised him of the situation which had progressed into a standoff with the suspect barricaded in his truck, still threatening to kill officers. Williams instructed Sgt. Lopez to request Harris County Special Response Unit (SWAT) and a Crisis Negotiator to come to the scene.

Harris County SWAT, along with Captain Williams and other agencies' command staffs, went in route to set up a command post at Love's Truck Stop, located just north of U.S. 290.

The HCSO negotiator talked to the then-identified suspect, 33-year-old Andrew Humphrey, for approximately an hour before SWAT used a distraction device, known as a flash-grenade, and removed him from the vehicle without anyone sustaining serious injury. No weapon was found in Humphrey's vehicle when it was searched.

Harris County took Humphrey into custody and transported him to the Harris County Jail without further incident. Humphrey is from Princeton, Indiana, and according to the Princeton Daily Clarion, he was charged with making a terroristic threat.

Captain Williams stated, "All responding law enforcement officers used good judgment and training for a positive outcome here in the City of Waller."

The Voice of an Angel: Remembering Mae Helen James

Mae Helen Wilson James was a native of Prairie View, Texas. She was born on August 2, 1933 into a family of Prairie View educators. Both her mother and father taught at Prairie View A&M University. Her father, Jessie Wilson, was an industrial arts professor and her mother also taught at the university, in addition to teaching private piano lessons.

Early on in Mae Helen's life, it was discovered that she possessed a beautiful soprano singing I was blessed to meet her while voice, and she was often called I was a member of St. Katharine View community.

school, she was awarded a full music scholarship to prestigious Howard University in Washington, DC., where she earned a Bachelor's Degree in Music in 1956. During her college years, she performed in the renowned Howard University Choir. She later earned a Master's in Music from Prairie View A&M.

Mae Helen went on to teach for several years in high schools both in New York State and in the Prairie View-Waller area. She also served her community as City Secretary for the City of Prairie View, Secretary for the Dean of Women at Prairie View A&M, as well as Dormitory Director for the Honors Dorm. In addition, she served for many years as music director, lead vocalist, and pianist at St. Martin de Porres Catholic Church in Prairie View. In later years, she was a faithful choir member at St. Katharine Drexel Catholic Church in Hempstead, Texas.

I can attest to Mae Helen's piercingly clear, opera-like voice.

spite her failing health, until the last few months of her life.

Unable to drive, she was often assisted by her longtime friend, Mrs. Mary Hawkins, a retired mathematics professor who taught for several years at Prairie View A&M. Mary helped Mae Helen for years by driving her to church and often to doctor's appointments. She was a true blessing in Mae Helen's life. Mary said that even to this day, the choir never fails to think of Mae Helen when they have difficulty reaching that high note that Mae Helen always reached with ease.

Mae Helen was a beloved choir member. According to Jerry La Mere, St. Katharine Drexel Choir Director, Mae Helen had a "great spirit", and will be sorely missed.

La Mere also related a story that attested to Mae Helen's endurance. Last Easter Vigil, she was taken to mass by her son Everett. Mae Helen was in a wheelchair at the time, but was determined to hold on to her lighted vigil candle, even though it kept tipping and

health, never let anyone or anything get her down."

Longtime choir member and cantor, Becky Gurrola said, "Mae Helen was an inspiration to all." On a humorous note, Becky reminded me of an often-repeated phrase that Mae Helen would say. and powerful, that often at the end of a choir piece, her voice could be heard well above the others. Mae Helen."

Knowing that she really should just blend in with the choir, she would smile that famous smile and tell the choir jokingly, "The devil made me do it." Everyone would laugh.

Mae Helen left this earth on August 6, while in the hospital. Her heart simply stopped beating, and she died in peace.

When I heard about her passing, my first thought was that she is now singing a joyful song to the Lord in heaven.

Rev. David Harris, Pastor of St. Katharine Drexel Catholic Church, officiated the funeral mass on August 12 at the church, and during the homily, described Mae Helen as a loving, good person who will be sorely missed.

The choir practiced to perform the music for the funeral, and afterwards were mightily complimented for their music. Mae Helen's voice was so strong Mary Hawkins stated, "We felt good about it, and know we did our best to sing our hearts out for

Mae Helen is survived by her brother, James W. Wilson, Jr. of Austin, and by her four children: Everett James of Prairie View; Suzanne Donovan of Lithonia, Georgia; Kevin James of Corona, California; Shawn James of Towanda, Pennsylvania, as well as eight grandchildren.

Mae Helen was laid to rest at The Evergreen Cemetery in Austin, Texas, alongside her mother, Helen Grant Wilson.







The Mark

You may have heard about the "Mark of the Beast" and "666." Novels have been written, movies produced, most of them without a careful analysis of the Biblical context. You see, Scripture spoke about it first in the book of Revelation 13:11-18. It is the subject for a whole separate study, but suffice it to say that mark is something we want to avoid! It identifies evil and produces eternal consequences.

It is imperative to understand first the opposite of the mark of the beast, and that is the mark that God desires to put on his people! Yes, He has a mark. The exciting book of Ezekiel tells us about it. Ezekiel saw God about to command judgment on Jerusalem. (If you look at current events and compare them with Christ's signs mentioned in Matthew 24, you can see we

are about to see another act of judgment from Heaven as Christ returns for His people!)

Before Ezekiel saw evil being punished, he saw mercy. One messenger was given a special command:

And the LORD said unto him, Go through the midst of the city, through the midst of Jerusalem, and set a mark upon the foreheads of the men that sigh and that cry for all the abominations that be done in the midst thereof. (Ezekiel 9:4)

Here is a mark given not for those who are evil, but for those who cry at evil! It is a mark to identify those who were already exhibiting this chracter trait. In other words, those who have the heart of Jesus, who Himself cried at our unbelief (see Mt 23:37-39; Luke 19:41-44, John 11:35). It is interesting to note here that the Hebrew word for "mark" is "tau," the last letter of the Hebrew alphabet. This letter in Ezekiel's day was shaped like a cross. The cross of Christ represents how deeply God abhors sin. So much, that in order to prevent His creations from its eternal consequences, He sent His only Son to suffer its wrath! And I believe Heaven cried on that day. We are called to react to sin the same way. Not with a literal cross on our literal forehead (Ezekiel is a prophetic/symbolic book), but by allowing the understanding of the price of sin-and, by contrast, the love of God-- to overwhelm us and compel us to Godly living.

Ezekiel then tells us that God commanded the Heavenly messengers to kill the evil ones in the city, but to avoid one group:

"...do not come near anyone on whom is the mark." (Ezekiel 9:6)

What wonderful protection! Here is described the remnant, God's remaining people. So having the cross of Christ saturating our lives causes us to first weep with Him. We are not participating in the errors and immorality around us. (Not even Spiritual leaders were excused from accountability. Judgment started with the elders at the Temple). By this response, by taking on Christ, we are spared. We end up becoming God's last-day people who are spared as they are "sealed" on their "foreheads" (Revelation 7:4).

Do you want to be part of God's kingdom? Let's learn from this lesson today. Embrace God's amazing love and let Him transform you with his character (Rom 12:1-2). Weep at the sin on TV. Reject the values that saturate the internet. Most importantly, weep at your own sin...and receive His "mark"!

Remembering Our 9/11 First Responders

As we approach the 14th memorial remembrance of the tragedy of 9/11, we must also remember the valor of our first responders, many of whom lost their lives on that sorrowful day.

Three hundred and fortythree firefighters, (including a chaplain, two paramedics and a fire marshall), 37 police officers, eight EMT's, and one fire patrolman lost their lives on 9/11 while trying to save the lives of others.

Sixty to seventy thousand brave first responders responded to the call that day in New York City, at the Pentagon in Washington, D.C., and at the scene of the downed airliner in Shanksville, Pennsylvania. Over 250 firefighters were injured and thousands were exposed to hazardous dust particles from the destruction of the twin towers in New York City.

Today, 2,518 rescue works, mostly firefighters and EMT's, are battling cancer as a result of their brave dedication to their fellow man that day.

In 2010, Congress passed legislation officially called the City Police Officer who died of James Zadroga Health and Com- a respiratory disease attributed to

pensation Act to provide monitoring, medical treatment, and compensation to those exposed to and made sick by toxic exposure resulting from 9/11.

Zadroga was a New York

his participation in rescue and recovery operations in the rubble of the World Trade Center. The Act is due to expire, and Congress has put forth a new bill which would make the Zadroga Act permanent. It is currently under debate in both the House and the Senate.

Rich Allen, Deputy Chief of the New York City Fire Department, testified before Congress saying, "Never forgetting 9/11 is a hollow political statement. Congress needs to pass this legislation. Actions speak louder than words."

Texas Peace Officers Memorial Badge Gains Favor

Texas has adopted a Peace Officer Memorial Badge to be worn in honor of Texas police officers who have died in the line of duty.

In the wake of the horrific unprovoked execution of Houston's Harris County Deputy Officer Darren GoForth, the badge was displayed on local television news stations, and it has an interesting history.

Historically, the heraldry on the badge can be traced to Scotland, probably because in early American history, men of Irish and Scottish descent served overwhelmingly in the nation's law enforcement agencies. According to legend, the "guardian of the thistle", dis-

played on the badge, played its part in defense of the ancient realm of Scotland against Viking attacks more than 1,000 years ago.

The phrase on the badge "nemo me impune lacessit" is Latin for "No one wounds me with impunity: or "no one harms me and gets away with it" in modern language. This phrase has been adopted for centuries by Scottish regiments as their motto and has spread internationally to be used by peace officers throughout the world. Today, the badge is worn to express support for fallen officers and their fami-

The back of the badge has a special die struck inscribed with these words, "Honoring Those Who Stood the Thin Blue Line of Texas."

Sadly in 2015, there has been a 15% increase in the fatalities of law enforcement officers nationwide.

Not all law enforcement agencies have the special badge, but wear instead a black band over their badge to show respect for their fallen brethren.

In both the Waller Police Department and at the Waller County Sheriff's Office, many officers wear black bands over their badge with some bearing the traditional Latin phrase, "Nemo me impune lacessit." These bands will be worn until their fellow officer is buried.


